Author Visit

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BRIGHT LEGACY | Honoring the past, present and future

Pright Legacy is a new alumni program that honors and recognizes families with multiple generations of graduates and students. For the 2021-22 school year, there were 40 families with enrolled students that included parents who graduated from Bright School, and of those, several included parents and grandparents who went to Bright.

Legacy families help preserve traditions and the history of the school. That could not be better demonstrated by the Smith-Street

family, which has four generations of Bright students. A new display in the front lobby of the school explains the history of the current location and honors the family connections. It reads:

"The Bright School moved from 833 Fort Wood Street near downtown to the current location in 1963. The building was designed by architect Gordon Laidlaw Smith, who combined traditional and modern themes in his work. This is demonstrated by the classic brick and colonnaded entrance and the clean glass-walled quadrangle overlooking a courtyard. Gordon P. Street, chairman of the board of trustees, oversaw the project. The Smith and Street family includes four generations of Bright School graduates and students. The Carter family donated 10 acres, and the school bought another 12 acres for the campus. Construction began in 1962, and the students, faculty and staff moved into the building in spring 1963. The original building included classrooms for kindergarten through sixth grade, an auditorium, cafeteria and gym.

The gym was converted to a library, and a new gym was completed in 1973. The next addition was in 1987 with more classrooms and science and technology spaces. The Early Childhood Center was completed in 2001, and the school added

ages 3 and 4 and discontinued sixth grade. The Gus McCravey Athletic Complex, including the track and field, was completed in 2015."

Mr. Smith's family includes four generations of Bright School graduates and students: daughter-in-law Frances Street Smith '42, Gordon L. "Trip" Smith III '66, Preston Smith '68, Sally Smith Crimmins '70, Jenny Smith Wright '91, Gordon L. "Skip" Smith II '94, Alice Smith Harris '97, Lauren Wright '10, Sara Wright '18 and Ben Harris '27. Trip Smith, who as a student recalled walking through the school as it was being built, served as chairman of the Board of Trustees and helped oversee construction of the 1987 wing for additional classrooms. His wife, Chris Benz Smith, served as president of the Parents' Association.

Mr. Street's family includes Gordon P. Street Jr. '50, Gordon P. Street III '77, Lorie Street Runge '75, L'Anne Street Gilman '81, Miriam Street Novotny '83, Nicholas Mallchok '03, Eller Mallchok Kelliher '04, and Parker Mallchok '05.

CITIZEN OF THE

Meghan Boehm '16

igh school junior Meghan Boehm '16 gives back to the community in many ways and is this year's recipient of the Citizen of the World Award. Meghan, who is a student at GPS, visited the fifth grade classrooms to accept the award and talk to students.

The Citizen of the World Award recognizes alumni who are fulfilling the school's mission: "The Bright School builds a foundation upon which students become wise and compassionate citizens of the world. Its century of progress fosters the intellectual, artistic, physical, and moral growth of young boys and girls." To be eligible for the award, alumni must be current students in high school (grades 9-12), college. or graduate school. The winning alumni demonstrate leadership in service to others in the broader community. Anyone may nominate an alum for the award. Fifth graders read through the nominations (with names and schools redacted), score the nominees with a rubric, and select the winner.

Two years ago, Meghan decided to start a fundraiser for the Walter E. Boehm Birth Defects Center, which helps babies, children and adults fix or improve brain and spine defects. The fundraiser, dubbed "Share a Scare," benefitted the center, which provides medical care for free to anyone who cannot afford their medical treatment and provides financial support for the families to be able to make trips to receive the medical care they need. Meghan met with company executives across Chattanooga to ask for sponsorships for "Share a Scare," in which donors purchase signs to display in lawns at their homes or homes of their friends. She was inspired to find a new type of fundraiser because the pandemic halted many in-person gatherings. So far, \$54,000 in sponsorships and an additional \$11,650 from selling 570 signs has been raised through the fundraiser. She also spent last summer volunteering at Erlanger Hospital and getting to know patients who benefited from the center.

Meghan, who has played the violin since age 6, is a member of the Chattanooga Youth Symphony Orchestra. Realizing not everyone can afford music lessons, Meghan volunteers in a program to provide free violin lessons to elementary students.

According to her nomination, "Meghan uses her time and talents to give children the same opportunities that she has valued and enjoyed."

Head of School Kristin Watts presented Meghan with a certificate and \$100 check in her honor to donate to her non-profit of choice, the Boehm Birth Defects Center. Meghan spoke to the fifth graders about community service, and she answered questions about moving on to middle school and her plans for the future.







Alia Sherrow '16, a junior at Baylor, tutors at an innercity community center while

balancing a rigorous volleyball schedule. She has dedicated more than 140 hours to the program and served in a leadership role this year. Alia planned and raised money for a holiday party for the children and wrote a grant to seek funding for summer camp scholarships for the children at the center.



Lily Monen '17, a sophomore at Baylor, joined a community service program in 2020 to tutor inner-city children. According to the

nomination, Lily was the only one who stayed with the program throughout the 18 months the children were learning on Zoom. She worked one-on-one with a scholar who had significant learning challenges and required a great deal of patience. Lily has accrued more than 280 service hours and earned a position on the leadership board. She worked on a grant proposal for funding for an art program for the children.



Hannah Levin '15, a senior at GPS, enjoys history and honed critical thinking skills in a social justice class last

year. She is a member of Amnesty International, which works to end abuses of human rights. Hannah helped organize and advertise the group's poetry jams, letter writing campaigns, and fundraising events. Last summer, she was a counselor in training at a summer camp for Jewish children, mentoring nine- and ten-year-old girls and teaching dance.



Caroline Clark '16, a junior at GPS, organized a project to benefit 7th Well, an organization that

helps survivors of human trafficking. She collected more than 350 self-care products donated by fellow students and then delivered them to the organization. Caroline also has volunteered at Pilgrim Food Pantry and Chattanooga Area Food Bank and tutored Spanish at school.

John Shearer, a longtime news reporter, captured the spirit of the reunion in a column he writes for *The Chattanoogan*:

"The reunion turned out well – although it was probably too short an event for me. A small number of us had decided a year or so ago to have

one and began planning it. Of the less than 50 class members from the two sixth-grade classes still living, 14 showed up along with three or four spouses. About three others were planning to come, including key planner Scott Seretean all the way from Oklahoma, but had to cancel at the last minute for a variety of reasons. In

at the last minute for a variety of reasons. In Scott's case, it was due to tornadic activity in his home state."

"While some of the original school plant we remembered had been remodeled slightly or had new floor coverings, etc., it still felt like home. We reminisced about the great meals in the cafeteria, the Friday educational films and plays in the auditorium (now called a theater), the location of the original music room, and how the head of school's office was once the student or parent check-in location.

We continued walking down the hall away from the office and, almost by instinct, we decided to go in our old sixth-grade room with Miss Reeve, and those of us in her class posed for a picture outside the door." Janet Reeve joined the alumni at the event.

"We then went out on the quadrangle for another photo, and as we were finishing up there, I saw an older couple coming across the parking lot to the concourse, and I realized it was my old boys' phys ed coach Bill Wolcott and his wife. I had not seen him in about 50 years, and I ran up and reintroduced myself, and I was thankful he seemed to remember me – or at least courteously acted like he did!

We went in the current library that had been the old gym, and it was neat again going back in time. As we continued walking the halls, he told me when we went down one area that was where he learned the news that President John F. Kennedy had died in 1963, a couple of years or so before many of us would even enter kindergarten there."

"Overall, I was thankful for the experience of getting to add one more chapter – 50 years later – to my fun experience that had been Bright School. It was where I fell in love with history and geography, and where I was first nurtured in sports and writing and just encouraged to get the most out of life."

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The gym, long a fixture in the Bright School experience, has a new look after more than 45 years. In November 2021, the renovated gym was dedicated as the Pamela Dee Blevins Gymnasium in memory of the mother of Lauren Wolfford '99 and grandmother of current third grader Rett. The renovation was part of the Building a Bright Future Capital Campaign and made possible by the Schillhahn-Huskey Foundation. Taking part in the ribbon cutting were the Wolfford family, Mrs. Watts, Mrs. Kropff, Mr. Morgan and P.E. coaches past and present: Bobby Gendimenico, Ashley Linehart, Kristen Curtis, Bob Cutrer and Jan Connell.

The last two years have been full of change, and yet, in many ways Bright School has remained much the same.

Case in point: the gym. The gym is a familiar and beloved place since the mid-1970s when Coach Bob Cutrer planned the first ever gym show with children displaying their tumbling and athletic skills, and it has remained mostly the same until a major renovation in summer 2021.

When school began in August, the gym was still the gym, but it had been reborn into a shining and gleaming space with new lighting, paint, bleachers, flooring and climbing wall. Thanks to a generous gift from the Schillhahn-Huskey Foundation in the Building a Bright Future Capital Campaign, the gym was unveiled and dedicated as the Pamela Dee Blevins Gymnasium in November.

The new school year brought a new head of school. Kristin Watts, along with daughter, Colby, a second grader, began the year as a new parent and new student in the Bright community. Mrs. Watts is the first female head of school since 1982 and 13th head in the school's history.

She spent many hours observing and playing with children in the classrooms and memorized the names and faces of all 350 students, 60 faculty and staff and many, many parents and grandparents. She started a new tradition of visiting with each

child in the classroom on his or her birthday and presenting him or her with a special Bright School pencil.

"I am grateful for the opportunity this year to be a part of the Bright School community and to know our families. I have found tremendous joy in getting to know parents, children, and our faculty this year," Mrs. Watts said.

The history of the school, founded in 1913, is a demonstration of remarkable resilience and vision. Founder Mary G. Bright navigated through illnesses, the Great Depression, and two world wars. The last two years have been one of those challenges.

Mrs. Watts was immediately challenged to find ways to keep faculty, staff and students safe and healthy through the continuing pandemic and ever-changing health recommendations while learning everything there is to know about Bright School.

"The emotional toll of living with a virus for two years has impacted all of us. What has kept teachers and staff showing up every day throughout this pandemic is the joy the students bring to our lives each day," Mrs. Watts said.

And still, the school year ended with the 109th graduation with the familiar sound of recorders playing "Country Gardens" and girls in their white dresses and boys in their Bright plaid ties. For the third year, graduation was held outdoors, a necessity during the pandemic that has turned into a beautiful new tradition.

The school year saw the return of all plays performed by kindergarten through fifth grade. "Our plays are an important opportunity for our students to be on stage and feel the success that comes with their performance. Grade level plays are an important Bright School tradition that was started by Miss Bright," Mrs. Watts said.

We also had the PK Luau, King and Queen of Hearts for

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Valentine's Day, Grandparents' and Special Friends' Days, Open House, Bright Fit, scooter races, volleyball, basketball, the Bright Post, Camp Lookout, Splash Day, and the Bright School Picnic with all parents. So many events returned either as they were or in a different form for health reasons that may stay for good because people enjoyed the new format better.

One event that everyone wanted back was the Christmas Assembly when alumni come for candy canes from Santa, and they announce their names from the stage while the students wonder who will be oldest. To bring the community together and celebrate the holidays, there was a musical performance for current families and alumni outdoors in the form of a Christmas tree lighting in the courtyard in the early evening. Families brought ornaments to hang on the trees. It was unseasonably warm, and the hot chocolate very hot. There were more alumni from varying years – 1952 to 2021 – than in any recent time when the event was held during the school day in the Centennial Theater with Santa sneaking in through the back door. It was so successful and well-received, the tree lighting is planned again for December 2022. And yes, the school has already put in a request

for Santa to make a surprise visit to the theater for the assembly for students.

"We began the year excited to get back to school plays and field trips, felt excitement as we re-entered the dining hall, and enjoyed celebrating the holidays in a new way with our choir and handbells concert and community tree lighting. We realize that the traditions of Bright are a vital part of the experience for both students and parents and that these traditions make memories that last a lifetime," Mrs. Watts said.

Over the summer, more changes happened with the renovation of the library and 1987 wing. The third and final phase of the capital campaign includes the first renovation of the library since the 1970s when it was converted from the original gym built in 1963 into the library and the fourth, fifth, technology and science classrooms of the 1987 wing.

Again, the old and familiar becomes new and better. Everything needs a refresh once and a while, even when you're more than 100 years old.

Building a Bright Future Capital Campaign Update

Work on the third and final phase of the Building a Bright Future Capital Campaign began this spring with work on the library. All the books, historical items, furniture and shelves were boxed up and moved to another part of the school. With the carpet and furnishings removed, the space looked like what it was originally built to be – the gym. In fact, the current library was the gym until the current gym was built in 1973. A special celebration for the library reopening is being planned.

The library is not the only space getting an update this summer. The fourth and fifth grade, technology and science classrooms in the 1987 wing are being refurbished, too. Those areas will have new carpet, windows, and cabinets to go with the new furniture already in place. Art and shop are getting new flooring and plumbing, and art will have new windows. New flooring also has been installed in the Spanish and JPK classrooms beside the library.



The library was originally a gym when the campus was built in 1963. It was converted into a library when the new gym was built in 1973. Computers replaced the card catalogs many years ago, but the library has remained and will remain a place where children discover the love of reading and learning.

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

JULIAN NUNALLY '06

Labor Lawyer and New Dad

ulian Nunally likes the structure of the law and how it can used to help people and order society. It is for these reasons that he was drawn to become a lawyer. And for similar reasons of how the tenets of faith can be used to help people and guide society, he

also is heavily involved in the Christian community.

Nunally, who graduated from Bright in 2006, works now as a labor and employment lawyer for the Jones Day firm based in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Given all the changes to the work environment from the pandemic, this sector of law has been very busy these last two years. "There has been a myriad of problems that clients face due to ever-changing Covid policies," he said. "Those problems have allowed my work to be both interesting and dynamic."

Nunally went to McCallie School after Bright and earned
his bachelor's degree in the comparative study of religion at
Harvard University, where he was captain of the track and field team. His
thesis titled "Theology of Mass Incarceration" explored how Christianity

can help ameliorate the over-incarceration of our nation's most vulnerable. His thesis received cum laude honors. Julian went immediately from his undergraduate studies at Harvard to pursuing his law degree at Harvard Law School.

During his law school summer, he worked at Miller & Martin in Chattanooga under the mentorship of Chuck Lee, co-chair of the firm's labor and employment practice. "The structure of law in the arena of employment affects everyone. It is vital that our employment laws and regulations are fair and facilitate productivity," Nunally said. Another thing Nunally enjoys about his work is the crazy stories that arise from workplace altercations:

"Disputes in the workplace are dramatic. I love talking to people and hearing their stories."

He graduated from Harvard Law School in May 2020 in the midst of the worldwide shutdown due to COVID-19. He finished law school

virtually and had a virtual graduation. Nunally's first job out of law school involved serving as a judicial clerk for U.S. District Judge Wilhelmina M. Wright in St. Paul, Minnesota, for one year. Judge Wright was on President Biden's shortlist to be considered as a Supreme Court nominee.

Nunally met his wife, Kianna, at Harvard. She is studying to be a radiologist at the University of Minnesota and grew up in the area. "I didn't think I'd like it," Nunally said about living in Minnesota. "But it is more diverse than I expected, it has great food, and the traffic is not too bad." That's unlike Boston, where he enjoyed living "with people from all over the world" and going to school for seven years, but "the cost of living is astronomical, and traffic is a disaster." Their daughter was born this spring. Her name is Aletheia, which is the Greek word for truth.

While at McCallie, Nunally said his goal was to become a minister, and he plans to attend seminary later in life. He is a self-professed "rule follower," and that's what he likes about the law. "If

there are two lines, I'll try to stay between them," he said. "I don't like arguing. I like knowing how to settle and resolve disputes. Finding solutions that work for both parties is more attractive to me than merely arguing."

Bright School is where his educational journey took off. He appreciated "the amount of care teachers showed toward their students," Nunally said. "Having people who care about your growth is invaluable." He keeps up with classmates through social media mostly and reported they all went to college and seem to be happy. "Being surrounded by peers who want to succeed is helpful."

Some of his favorite events at Bright were the picnic, Santa's visit, the rocket launch,

plays and el mercado in Spanish class. One misstep he does remember is misspelling the word "grape" during the spelling bee, but it didn't seem to slow him down any. "It turned out OK," he said. "Bright School set me up for the many things I've been able to do."
