The library is temporarily processing new library cards online. Rather than going to a branch, families simply go to the website <u>chattlibrary.org</u> and select "Get a Library Card" from the top right hand corner. Follow the instructions and library staff will assist you through email.

There are many benefits for a student having a public library card.

- There is unlimited free access to audiobooks through the library's digital collection: Hoopla, OverDrive, and RB Digital. Students may wish to use these audiobooks during home learning or within the classroom.
